

# Regional Economic Trends

for Kalamazoo County

### KALAMAZOO COUNTY

The Trend: Kalamazoo County added 2,456 jobs from Q1 2021 to Q2 2021. Between September and October, the unemployment rate fell while the labor force participation rate and employment-to-population ratio rose slightly. This is likely a sign that unemployed individuals are finding work. Job postings were higher in October than in September, with registered nurse as the most in-demand job.

### **COUNTY UPDATE**



The labor force participation rate was 59.9% in October. This is a 0.1 percentage point increase from the previous month.



The employment-to-population ratio was 57.3% in October. This is an increase of 0.6 percentage points from the previous month.



The unemployment rate was 4.4% in October. This is a 0.8 percentage point decrease from the previous month.



The total labor force saw an increase of 289 people from September to October. The increase in employed people was 1,209, and the decrease in unemployed people was 920.



Total employment increased by 1.5% from Q1 2021 to Q2 2021.



There were 3,144 job postings in October, an increase of 18.9% from September.

The labor force participation rate, which measures the economy's active workforce, was 59.9% in Kalamazoo County in October. This was lower than the rate for west Michigan by 1.2 percentage points, and higher than that of the state of Michigan by 0.4 percentage points.

The employment-to-population ratio, which measures the proportion of the population that is employed, was 57.3% for Kalamazoo County in October. This was 1.1 percentage points below the ratio for west Michigan and 0.6 percentage points above that of the state of Michigan.



The unemployment rate, which measures the percentage of the workforce that is looking for work, was 4.4% in Kalamazoo County in October. This was 0.1 percentage points below the rate for west Michigan and 0.3 percentage points below the rate for the state of Michigan.

From September to October, the unemployment rate in Kalamazoo County decreased by 0.8 percentage points, to 4.4 percent. The unemployment rate for October was 0.9 percentage points lower than it was at the same time last year.

The total labor force in Kalamazoo County in October stood at 128,701, an increase of 289 people from the September labor force of 128,412. The labor force in Kalamazoo County has shrunk by 2.0% since October 2020, when it stood at 131,384. This indicates a decrease in the available labor for firms in the area.



# Employment Change, Q2 2020 to Q2 2021 (not seasonally adjusted)





The most recent data shows the greatest decrease in employment in Kalamazoo County from Q2 2020 to Q2 2021 was in government employment, which declined by 420 jobs, or 3.5%. The greatest increase in employment from Q2 2020 to Q2 2021 in the county was in leisure and hospitality, which grew by 2,588 jobs, or 31.4%.

The average weekly wage for nonfarm jobs in Kalamazoo County in Q2 2021 was \$1,110.


**Total Job Postings for October 2021**


The number of job postings in Kalamazoo County, which demonstrates demand for labor, increased by 18.9% between September and October, from 2,645 postings to 3,144. The majority of postings in the county, as reported through Burning Glass Technologies, were for full-time and permanent positions.

Types of Job Postings for October 2021





The top job occupations with job postings in October were registered nurse, retail sales associate, and warehouse worker. A plurality of job postings, 49.8%, required at minimum a bachelor's degree or higher. This is an increase of 5.2 percentage points from September in the proportion of job postings requiring a bachelor's degree or higher. The proportion of jobs requiring an associate degree increased by 0.1 percentage points from September, and the proportion of jobs requiring only a high school degree or vocational training decreased by 5.2 percentage points.
